4 <u>20-241</u> Robert Hunt will conduct a presentation relative to the Regional Saugus River Floodgate Project.

Bob Hunt, 1922 Main Street, Jefferson, MA 01522 conducted a presentation on the Saugus River Floodgate Project.

The Regional Saugus River Floodgate Project is a coastal flood protection project to provide a very high level of protection to the Cities of Lynn, Malden and Revere, and the town of Saugus, Massachusetts. The region is five (5) miles north of Boston and is the most vulnerable area along the Massachusetts coast to storm surge flooding and sea level rise, and possibly along the US coast.

The US Army Corps of Engineers New England Division investigated solutions to the problem with 5 Steering Committees over 4 years (\$2.6 million). The Recommended Regional Project includes a Floodgate structure at the mouth of the Saugus River with nine (9) gated openings, designed to provide safe passage for navigation and the natural tide levels and flushing in the 1,650 acre tidal Estuary landward of the gates. The Estuary would be purchased and managed to protect its flood water storage and environmental resources. The gates would be tied to 3.1 miles of shorefront improvements along Lynn Harbor, Point of Pines and the Revere Beach Reservation. It would protect 5,000 buildings, 8,000 housing units, 10,000 residents, 20,000 employees and 400,000 commuters in the region against the worst coastal storm likely to occur and against sea level rise, estimated damages at \$ 1.3 billion.

A 2.5 year final design effort (\$6 million) completed most investigations and the modeling of the Floodgates and shorefront improvements. The project would cost an estimated \$230 million (2020 p.l.) and be cost shared with the Federal Government. A narrow opening in an abandoned I-95 embankment restricts tidal flows to 500 acres in the upper Estuary deteriorating the wetlands. The project has the opportunity to breach the embankment and restore the wetlands.

Although the US Congress authorized the Project for construction, a new State Secretary of Environmental Affairs in the fall of 1993 was opposed to construction along the Massachusetts coast and stopped it, and since it has been de-authorized. Currently, renewed interest in the Project by the communities, along with the Governor's interest to help communities facing flooding from sea level rise, may help to restart the Project.

The Appointments Sub-Committee met on Monday afternoon, August 24, 2020 at 5:00PM. Committee members present were Councillors Giannino, McKenna, Powers, Visconti, Keefe (ex-officio), and Chairman Guinasso.

Council Order 20-217 Appointment of Dimple Rana as Executive Director to the Human Rights Commission. Mayor Arrigo and several members of the public addressed the sub-committee in support of Ms. Rana's appointment:

Letters of support from Women Encouraging Empowerment, Cambridge Health Alliance, and The Concilo Latino de Revere were also submitted to the sub-committee and made part of the record.

Councillor Keefe delivered several comments relative to his opposition to this appointment. To summarize, the City Council has requested on three occasions since 2014 to reinstate the Human Rights Commission and only now the Mayor has presented an appointment for an Executive Director to the Human Rights Commission without a Human Rights Commission in place. Furthermore, not one other candidate was ever considered or interviewed by the Mayor for the Executive Director position.

Councillor Visconti, in opposition to Ms. Rana's appointment, suggested that the Mayor should appoint an individual who is an attorney as Executive Director to the Human Rights Commission. This appears to be best practice as six out of seven communities in the Commonwealth which have a Human Rights Commission have an attorney serving in the capacity of Executive Director.

Councillor Serino also expressed his opposition to Ms. Rana's appointment as he believes she may not have enough available time to take on this role as Executive Director of the Human Rights Commission. It took several weeks for Ms. Rana to return a phone call to Councillor Serino and Ms. Rana also indicated that during the Fiscal Year 2021 budget process that she already has a heavy workload.

In reponse to Dimple Rana's failed confirmation by the City Council for the position of Executive Director of the Human Rights Commissions, Councillors Serino, Visconti, and Keefe offered the following Resolution on the floor:

Whereas, we the undersigned members of the Revere City Council recognize the urgent and critical need for the re-establishment of the Revere Human Rights Commission; and

Whereas, as a Council, we also recognize the deep division in our city and hear our residents who have suffered terrible injustice and want action, as well as our residents who wish to see our community move forward with a Human Rights Commission in a professional and unbiased manner, and in a manner that builds bridges and unites all residents of Revere; and

Whereas, we reaffirm our commitment that we unanimously made at our meeting on June 22nd, 2020 that hate has no place in the City of Revere and to expand on that statement, we explicitly denounce discrimination in our community based on race, gender, religion, sexual orientation or because of stigma; and

Whereas, under Chapter 9, Section 28 of our City Ordinances, it is the policy of the City of Revere to protect the constitutional, civil and human rights of all people within the city and to promote understanding among individuals and groups in the city through improving the quality of discourse and eliminating unlawful discrimination; and

Whereas, given the duties and charges of the Commission, particularly with regard to the sensitive nature of mediation of disputes of discrimination, we the undersigned members of the Revere City Council believe the role of executive director should be discharged preferably by an attorney of law who has a background in adjudicating violations of civil rights; and

Whereas, given the uniqueness of the work of the Commission compared to other boards and commissions of the City, as well as the desire of the Council that we get this right in order that the Commission is the best it can be, we believe the executive director of the Human Rights Commission should be selected from an open and transparent process in which the position is properly advertised and in which the candidates are interviewed by a committee composed of (1) the Mayor, (2) three members of the City Council appointed by the Council President, and (3) two members of the School Committee appointed by the Chair of the School Committee. The five members of the sub-committee who are not the Mayor shall recommend two final candidates to the Mayor, who shall select and appoint based on those final two recommendations. This process shall be completed, and the appointee shall be submitted to the City Council for confirmation no later than Monday, October 5, 2020; and

Whereas, the stipend of the executive director of the Human Rights Commission should be equitable and comparable to the clerks of other boards and commissions of the City; and *Whereas*, recognizing the urgency of getting the work of the Commission off the ground as soon as possible, that in the meantime, Mayor Brian Arrigo submit to the City Council appointments for the members of the Human Rights Commission at the earliest opportunity; therefore be it

Resolved that we the undersigned members of the Revere City Council stand ready to take up Mayor Arrigo's appointments of members to the Human Rights Commission at the earliest possible convenience during this summer session, and request that he does so in a manner that is timely advertised for both the members of the Council and the public to review the credentials of appointees.

While under suspension of rules, Councillor Rotondo filed for immediate reconsideration on the Resolution with the hope it does not prevail. Reconsideration fails.

Councillor Morabito left the Council Chamber after this motion.

Notice is hereby given that the Revere City Council will conduct a public hearing via remote participation on Monday evening, July 27, 2020 at 6:00 p.m. relative to the following proposed amendment to the Revised Ordinances of the City of Revere:

I. AN ORDINANCE FURTHER AMENDING TITLE 8 OF THE ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF REVERE

SECTION 1. Title 8 of the Revised Ordinances of the city of Revere is hereby amended by inserting the following new chapter and sections:

Title 8, Chapter 8.06 – Short-term rental

8.06.010 – Summary and Purpose.

Short-term rental for rental parties of no more than six renters shall be permitted in the City of Revere at a residential property that is owned by and contains the Primary Residence of the Operator as defined herein, for up to sixty days in a calendar year, properly registered in accordance with the provisions herein. This Chapter provides the process for the regulation, legal operation and registration of certain Short-term rentals in the city of Revere, in order to protect the safety of renters and residents, ensure that the primary use remains residential, and ensure that Short-term rentals will not be a detriment to the character and livability of the surrounding residential neighborhood.

8.06.020 – Definitions.

- A. Condominium Building: A building or structure containing individually-owned units created and existing in compliance with Mass.G.L. ch. 183A.
- B. Dwelling: A building or place of residence, classified for residential use.
- C. Operator: the owner of the Residential Unit that the owner seeks to offer as a Short-term Rental. Only one owner may be registered as an Operator on the Short-term Rental Registry for a Residential Unit.
- D. Owner-adjacent Unit: In a residential dwelling containing four or fewer residential units, each of them owned by the Operator, and one of them being the Operator's primary residence, an Owner-adjacent unit is any residential unit in the dwelling other than the Operator's primary residence unit.
- E. Primary Residence Unit: A Residential Unit that is the primary residence of the Operator, and is not located within a dwelling with other Residential Units; e.g. a single-family residential dwelling.
- F. Residential Unit: a dwelling unit within a dwelling that is classified as residential use and that contains at least one bedroom or sleeping area. For purposes of this Chapter, a Residential Unit shall not include any units in a hotel, motel, licensed rooming house or lodging house or licensed bed and breakfast.

- G. Short-term Rental: The rental for a fee of a Residential Unit, reserved in advance, for periodic residential occupancy for any number of days that shall not exceed, in any case, a cumulative total of sixty (60) days of rental within a calendar year.
- H. Short-term Rental Unit: a Residential Unit that is offered, advertised, or otherwise used for Short-term Rental.
- I. Short-term Rental Enforcement Office: the department designated by the Mayor authorized to implement, oversee, and enforce the provisions of this chapter and any other statutes, regulations, and ordinances relating to premises within the city of Revere that are advertised, listed or used as Short-term Rental.
- J. Short-term Rental Enforcement Officer: Any individual authorized by the Short-term Rental Enforcement Office to enforce the provisions of this chapter.
- K. Short-term Rental Registry: A database maintained by the Short-term Rental Enforcement Office that shall record and preserve information about Operators who are permitted to offer a Residential Units as Short-term Rental. The Short-term Rental Registry shall be maintained by the Short-term Rental Enforcement Office. A property not listed in the Short-term Rental Registry is prohibited from being offered for Shortterm Rental.

8.06.030 – Applicability and Limitations.

- A. Short-term Rental shall be permitted only:
 - of an Owner-adjacent Unit in an owner-occupied Condominium building; Only one such Owner-adjacent unit may be registered and utilized for Shortterm Rental and must be rented as an entire unit at any one time to one rental party of no more than six unrelated persons comprising Short-term renters exclusive of children under 12 years of age, and the division within the unit of separate bedrooms for separate rental parties is prohibited; or
 - 2. of an Owner-adjacent Unit in an Owner-occupied dwelling containing four or fewer residential units. Only one such Owner-adjacent unit may be registered and utilized for Short-term Rental and must be rented as an entire unit at any one time to one rental party of no more than six unrelated persons comprising Short-term renters exclusive of children under 12 years of age, and the division within the unit of separate bedrooms for separate rental parties is prohibited; or
 - 3. of a Primary Residence Unit. A Primary Residence Unit offered for Shortterm Rental must be rented as a whole unit at any one time to one party of no more than six unrelated persons comprising Short-term renters exclusive of children under 12 years of age, and the division within the unit of separate bedroom for separate rental parties is prohibited.
- B. Short-term Rental occupancy shall be limited to two persons per bedroom, excluding children under the age of 12 related to, or the legal ward of, either bedroom occupant.

- C. The registration of a Short-term Rental unit shall expire in the event ownership of the unit or the property containing the unit is transferred. A new owner of such property shall be responsible to complete a new Registration process as described in section 8.06.040.
- D. The number of individual bedrooms made available for Short-term Rental within an Owner-adjacent Unit and Primary Residence Unit shall not be greater than the number of lawful bedrooms in the dwelling unit.
- E. No Short-term Rental may be used for the purpose of a commercial meeting and commercial use of a Short-term Rental unit is prohibited.
- F. Sublet or sub-rental of a Short-term Rental Unit or a room or space therein is prohibited. The Renter of a Short-term Rental cannot sublet rooms or spaces in their units as Short-term Rentals or in any other manner.
- G. Hourly rentals are prohibited.

8.06.040 - Procedure to Register Short-term Rentals.

Before any property is offered or advertised for Short-term Rental, the Operator shall:

- A. Register the property with the Short-term Rental Enforcement Office on a form provided by the Office. The application shall require:
 - 1. The Operator's full name and address, and a telephone number (land and/or mobile) that is available 24 hours per day to renters, the Short-term Rental Enforcement Office, and public safety authorities.
 - 2. The name, address and telephone number (land and/or mobile) of an individual other than the Operator who shall be available in the event the Operator is unavailable, and who shall be capable to respond as soon as may be necessary to any issue or emergency that arises during a Short-term Rental.
 - 3. An accurate description of the area of the property that is available for Short-term Rental. [E.g. one bedroom apartment on second floor; E.g. Single family home at specified address].
 - 4. Documentation that the property in question is not the subject of any municipal liens and that all taxes and fees owed to the City of Revere and to the Commonwealth of Massachusetts relating to the property are paid up to date.
 - 5. Proof, in the form of a valid insurance binder, of liability insurance with liability limits in an amount no less than \$250,000 per incident and coverage for Short-term Rental use.
- B. Pay the annual fee of \$200.00 per Short-term Rental unit in addition to any fees as required in accordance with section 08.06.060 of this Chapter.
- C. Request the Short-term Rental Office to conduct an Inspection, which shall be completed within 21 days of date the completed application is submitted and associated fee is paid.

- 1. In the event a unit is approved for Short-term Rental after an inspection, the Shortterm Rental Enforcement Office shall issue a Certificate of Inspection to the Applicant/Operator and the Unit shall be listed in the Registry for a period that shall expire on December 31 of the year the Certificate is issued.
- 2. In the event a Short-term Rental unit is not approved after inspection, the Applicant/Owner may cure any issue that prevented approval and request a re-inspection at no additional fee.
- 3. In the event any further inspection is necessary after an initial re-inspection, a fee of \$50 shall be required for each further Inspection.
- D. No property shall be included in the Short-term Rental Registry until the requirements of subsections A C inclusive are completed and a Certificate of Inspection is issued.

8.06.050 – Requirements To Operate a Short-term Rental

- A. A Short-term Rental unit shall be registered in accordance with 8.06.040 of this Title to be lawful in the City of Revere.
- B. Residential Owner-adjacent and Primary Residence Units offered for Short-term Rental shall comply with, and shall not be in violation of, all standards and regulations promulgated by the Short-term Rental Enforcement Office and the Revere Fire Department's Office of Fire Prevention, including but not limited to, all relevant, zoning, building, sanitary, fire, and health and safety laws, regulations, and ordinances.
- C. The Operator of a Short-term Rental shall keep and maintain for a period of three years an accurate record of the names and dates of rental for each Short-term Rental and make such record available upon request from a Short-term Rental Enforcement Officer.
- D. All Short-term Rentals shall be subject to annual inspections by the Short-term Rental Enforcement Office and the Revere Fire Department's Office of Fire Prevention.
- E. Every Operator of a Short-term Rental shall provide to every Short-term Rental party a document containing the following information:
 - 1. Instructions for disposal of waste that complies with the City's recycling and trash programs.
 - 2. An emergency exit diagram for all bedrooms.
 - 3. Contact information for the Short-term Rental Operator, or when the Operator is not present, the contact information for a locally available contact designated to respond to all emergencies and problems that may arise during the rental period, whether from renters, neighbors or municipal authorities.
 - 4. The certificates of registration for the Short-term Rental as required by M.G.L. ch. 62C, § 67, and this Chapter (see R.R.O. 8.06.040).
 - 5. A clear and direct instruction that Short-term renters shall not disturb the peace or cause to disturb the quite enjoyment in the neighborhood or in any way interfere with the quality of life of the community by noise or other disturbances in accordance with, but not limited to, R.R.O. 9.08.010 et seq.

- F. A Poster measuring no less than 11" wide and 14" height containing the information described in Paragraph E, 1-5, above, shall be posted in a conspicuous place in every Short-term Rental Unit.
- G. A sign measuring no less than 8.5" wide and 11" height illustrating the emergency exit shall be posted in each bedroom.

8.06.050 - Ineligible residential units.

The following Residential Units are not eligible to be offered as Short-term Rentals:

- A. Residential Units that do not meet the definition of either an Owner-adjacent Unit or a Primary Residence Unit.
- B. Residential Units designated as below market rate or income-restricted, that are subject to affordability covenants, or that are otherwise subject to housing or rental assistance under local, state or federal law.
- C. Residential Units subject to any requirement of local, state or federal law that prohibits the leasing or subleasing of the unit or use of the unit as a Short-term Rental.
- D. Residential Units that are the subject of three (3) or more findings of violations of this chapter within a one-year period, or three (3) or more violations of any municipal ordinance or state law or code relating to health, safety, sanitary conditions, including, but not limited to, excessive noise, improper disposal of trash, disorderly conduct or other similar conduct within a one-year period.
- E. Residential Units previously rented to a Section 8 Certificate holder or that were previously subject to any affordability covenants, unless one year has expired since the expiration of the Section 8 tenancy or affordability restriction.
- F. Any Residential Unit for which the Operator is delinquent in the payment of any local taxes, fees, assessments, betterments or municipal charges of any kind.

8.06.060 - Local excise tax and community impact fee.

A Residential Unit subject to the provisions of this Chapter shall pay all excise tax and community impact fees on Short-term Rentals as approved by the City Council pursuant to Sections 3A and 3D of Chapter 64G of the Massachusetts General Laws.

8.06.070 – Enforcement and penalties.

A. Any person who (i) offers a unit as a Short-term Rental where such unit is not an eligible Residential Unit, (ii) offers an eligible Residential Unit as a Short-term Rental without registering such Short-term Rental Unit with ISD, or (iii) offers an eligible Residential Unit as a Short-term Rental while the unit's registration on the Short-term Rental Registry is suspended, shall be fined \$300.00 per violation per day. Each day's failure to comply with a notice of violation or any other

Order shall constitute a separate violation. In addition to fines described in this section, the City may seek an injunction from a court of competent jurisdiction to enjoin the offering, advertising, or use of the unit as a Short-term Rental.

B. The provisions of this Chapter shall be enforced in accordance with R.R.O Chapter 1.12, Article II, or Article III, which includes the provision of M.G.L. ch. 40U, or by seeking to restrain a violation by a court-ordered injunction.

In accordance with an Executive Order issued on March 12, 2020 by Governor Baker, the public hearings as advertised will be held remotely. Title 8, Chapter 8.06 – Short-term rental

8.06.010 - Summary and Purpose.

8.06.015 Exclusions

- A. <u>The provisions of this ordinance do not apply to the accommodation, for a</u> <u>fee, of a bedroom or attached apartment contained within and accessible</u> <u>through the Operator's Primary Residence Unit and is not accessed</u> exclusively through a separate entry.
- B. <u>The provisions of this ordinance do not apply to any month-to-month</u> tenancy at will agreement between a landlord and a tenant.
- C. <u>The provisions of this ordinance do not alter or nullify any municipal</u> <u>ordinance governing the construction, alteration, conversion, use, and</u> <u>regulation of a lodginghouse, roominghouse, or bordinghouse.</u>

8.06.020 – **Definitions.**

- A. Condominium Building: A building or structure containing individually-owned units created and existing in compliance with Mass.G.L. ch. 183A.
- B. Dwelling: A building or place of residence, classified for residential use.
- C. Operator: the owner of the Residential Unit that the owner seeks to offer as a Short-term Rental. Only one owner may be registered as an Operator on the Short-term Rental Registry for a Residential Unit.

- F. Primary Residence Unit: A Residential Unit that is the primary residence of the Operator, and is not located within a dwelling with other Residential Units; e.g. a single-family residential dwelling.
- G. Residential Unit: a dwelling unit within a dwelling that is classified as residential use and that contains at least one bedroom or sleeping area. For purposes of this Chapter, a Residential Unit shall not include any units in a hotel, motel, licensed rooming house or lodging house or licensed bed and breakfast.
- H. Short-term Rental: The rental for a fee of a Residential Unit, reserved in advance, for periodic residential occupancy <u>for a single rental period of fewer than 30</u> <u>davs</u> days <u>and not exceeding</u> in any case a cumulative total of sixty (60) days of rental within a calendar year.
- I. Short-term Rental Unit: a Residential Unit that is offered, advertised, or otherwise used for Short-term Rental.
- J. Short-term Rental Enforcement Office: the department designated by the Mayor authorized to implement, oversee, and enforce the provisions of this chapter and any other statutes, regulations, and ordinances relating to premises within the city of Revere that are advertised, listed or used as Short-term Rental.
- K. Short-term Rental Enforcement Officer: Any individual authorized by the Shortterm Rental Enforcement Office to enforce the provisions of this chapter.
- L. Short-term Rental Registry: A database maintained by the Short-term Rental Enforcement Office that shall record and preserve information about Operators who are permitted to offer a Residential Units as Short-term Rental. The Shortterm Rental Registry shall be maintained by the Short-term Rental Enforcement Office. A property not listed in the Short-term Rental Registry is prohibited from being offered for Short-term Rental.

8.06.030 – Applicability and Limitations.

- A. Short-term Rental shall be permitted only:
 - of an Owner-adjacent Unit in an owner-occupied Condominium building. <u>In any case where an Operator uses more than one</u> <u>Owner-adjacent condominium unit for Short-term rental, each</u> <u>such</u> Owner-adjacent condominium unit <u>shall</u> be registered <u>separately</u> <u>and charged a separate fee in accordance with this Chapter. An</u>

owner-adjacent condominium unit must be rented as an entire unit at any one time to one rental party of no more than six unrelated persons comprising Short-term renters exclusive of children under 12 years of age, and the division within the unit of separate bedrooms for separate rental parties is prohibited; or

- 2. of an Owner-adjacent Unit in an Owner-occupied dwelling containing four or fewer residential units. In any case where an Operator uses more than one such Owner-adjacent unit for Short-term rental, each such Owner-adjacent unit shall be registered separately and charged a separate fee in accordance with this Chapter. An owner-adjacent unit must be rented as an entire unit at any one time to one rental party of no more than six unrelated persons comprising Short-term renters exclusive of children under 12 years of age, and the division within the unit of separate bedrooms for separate rental parties is prohibited; or
- 3. of a Primary Residence Unit. A Primary Residence Unit offered for Short-term Rental must be rented as a whole unit at any one time to one party of no more than six unrelated persons comprising Short-term renters exclusive of children under 12 years of age, and the division within the unit of separate bedroom for separate rental parties is prohibited.
- B. Short-term Rental occupancy shall be limited to two persons per bedroom, excluding children under the age of 12 related to, or the legal ward of, either bedroom occupant.
- C. The registration of a Short-term Rental unit shall expire in the event ownership of the unit or the property containing the unit is transferred. A new owner of such property shall be responsible to complete a new Registration process as described in section 8.06.040.
- D. The number of individual bedrooms made available for Short-term Rental within an Owner-adjacent Unit and Primary Residence Unit shall not be greater than the number of lawful bedrooms in the dwelling unit.
- E. No Short-term Rental may be used for the purpose of a commercial meeting and commercial use of a Short-term Rental unit is prohibited.
- F. Sublet or sub-rental of a Short-term Rental Unit or a room or space therein is prohibited. The Renter of a Short-term Rental cannot sublet rooms or spaces in their units as Short-term Rentals or in any other manner.
- G. Hourly rentals are prohibited.

8.06.040 – Procedure to Register Short-term Rentals.

Before any property is offered or advertised for Short-term Rental, the Operator shall:

- A. Register the property with the Short-term Rental Enforcement Office on a form provided by the Office. The application shall require:
 - 1. The Operator's full name and address, and a telephone number (land and/or mobile) that is available 24 hours per day to renters, the Short-term Rental Enforcement Office, and public safety authorities.
 - The name, address and telephone number (land and/or mobile) of an individual other than the Operator who shall be available in the event the Operator is unavailable, and who shall be capable to respond as soon as may be necessary to any issue or emergency that arises during a Short-term Rental.
 - 3. An accurate description of the area of the property that is available for Shortterm Rental. [E.g. one bedroom apartment on second floor; E.g. Single family home at specified address].
 - 4. Documentation that the property in question is not the subject of any municipal liens and that all taxes and fees owed to the City of Revere and to the Commonwealth of Massachusetts relating to the property are paid up to date.
 - 5. Proof, in the form of a valid insurance binder, of liability insurance with liability limits in an amount no less than \$250,000 per incident and coverage for Short-term Rental use.
- B. Pay the annual fee of \$200.00 per Short-term Rental unit in addition to any fees as required in accordance with section 08.06.060 of this Chapter.
- C. Request the Short-term Rental Office to conduct an Inspection, which shall be completed within 21 days of date the completed application is submitted and associated fee is paid.
 - 1. In the event a unit is approved for Short-term Rental after an inspection, the Short-term Rental Enforcement Office shall issue a Certificate of Inspection to the Applicant/Operator and the Unit shall be listed in the Registry for a period that shall expire on December 31 of the year the Certificate is issued.
 - 2. In the event a Short-term Rental unit is not approved after inspection, the Applicant/Owner may cure any issue that prevented approval and request a re-inspection at no additional fee.

- 3. In the event any further inspection is necessary after an initial re-inspection, a fee of \$50 shall be required for each further Inspection.
- D. No property shall be included in the Short-term Rental Registry until the requirements of subsections A C inclusive are completed and a Certificate of Inspection is issued.

8.06.050 - Requirements To Operate a Short-term Rental

- A. A Short-term Rental unit shall be registered in accordance with 8.06.040 of this Title to be lawful in the City of Revere.
- B. Residential Owner-adjacent and Primary Residence Units offered for Short-term Rental shall comply with, and shall not be in violation of, all standards and regulations promulgated by the Short-term Rental Enforcement Office and the Revere Fire Department's Office of Fire Prevention, including but not limited to, all relevant, zoning, building, sanitary, fire, and health and safety laws, regulations, and ordinances.
- C. The Operator of a Short-term Rental shall keep and maintain for a period of three years an accurate record of the names and dates of rental for each Short-term Rental and make such record available upon request from a Short-term Rental Enforcement Officer.
- D. All Short-term Rentals shall be subject to annual inspections by the Short-term Rental Enforcement Office and the Revere Fire Department's Office of Fire Prevention.
- E. Every Operator of a Short-term Rental shall provide to every Short-term Rental party a document containing the following information:
 - 1. Instructions for disposal of waste that complies with the City's recycling and trash programs.
 - 2. An emergency exit diagram for all bedrooms.
 - 3. Contact information for the Short-term Rental Operator, or when the Operator is not present, the contact information for a locally available contact designated to respond to all emergencies and problems that may arise during the rental period, whether from renters, neighbors or municipal authorities.
 - 4. The certificates of registration for the Short-term Rental as required by M.G.L. ch. 62C, § 67, and this Chapter (see R.R.O. 8.06.040).
 - 5. A clear and direct instruction that Short-term renters shall not disturb the peace or cause to disturb the quite enjoyment in the neighborhood or in any way interfere with the quality of life of the community by noise or other disturbances in accordance with, but not limited to, R.R.O. 9.08.010 et seq.
- F. A Poster measuring no less than 11" wide and 14" height containing the information described in Paragraph E, 1-5, above, shall be posted in a conspicuous place in every Short-term Rental Unit.
- G. A sign measuring no less than 8.5" wide and 11" height illustrating the emergency exit shall be posted in each bedroom.

<u>8.06.060</u> – Ineligible residential units.

The following Residential Units are not eligible to be offered as Short-term Rentals:

- A. Residential Units that do not meet the definition of either an Owneradjacent Unit, or a Primary Residence Unit.
- B. Residential Units designated as below market rate or income-restricted, that are subject to affordability covenants, or that are otherwise subject to housing or rental assistance under local, state or federal law.
- C. Residential Units subject to any requirement of local, state or federal law, or rule or regulation promulgated by a condominium association, that prohibits the leasing or subleasing of the unit or use of the unit as a Shortterm Rental.
- D. Residential Units that are the subject of three (3) or more findings of violations of this chapter within a one-year period, or three (3) or more violations of any municipal ordinance or state law or code relating to health, safety, sanitary conditions, including, but not limited to, excessive noise, improper disposal of trash, disorderly conduct or other similar conduct within a one-year period.
- E. Residential Units previously rented to a Section 8 Certificate holder or that were previously subject to any affordability covenants, unless one year has expired since the expiration of the Section 8 tenancy or affordability restriction.
- F. Any Residential Unit for which the Operator is delinquent in the payment of any local taxes, fees, assessments, betterments or municipal charges of any kind.

8.06.060 - Local excise tax and community impact fee.

A Residential Unit subject to the provisions of this Chapter shall pay all excise tax and community impact fees on Short-term Rentals as approved by the City Council pursuant to Sections 3A and 3D of Chapter 64G of the Massachusetts General Laws.

8.06.070 – Enforcement and penalties.

A. Any person who (i) offers a unit as a Short-term Rental where such unit is not an eligible Residential Unit, (ii) offers an eligible Residential Unit as a Short-term Rental without registering such Short-term Rental Unit with ISD, or (iii) offers an eligible Residential Unit as a Short-term Rental

while the unit's registration on the Short-term Rental Registry is suspended, shall be fined \$300.00 per violation per day. Each day's failure to comply with a notice of violation or any other Order shall constitute a separate violation. In addition to fines described in this section, the City may seek an injunction from a court of competent jurisdiction to enjoin the offering, advertising, or use of the unit as a Short-term Rental.

B. The provisions of this Chapter shall be enforced in accordance with R.R.O Chapter 1.12, Article II, or Article III, which includes the provision of M.G.L. ch. 40U, or by seeking to restrain a violation by a court-ordered injunction.



AUTHORITY & FEDERAL FUNDING

The Regional Saugus River Floodgate Project would provide a very high degree of coastal flood protection to the cities of Everett, Lynn, Malden and Revere, and the town of Saugus, Massachusetts who face the recurring and severe threat from coastal flooding and accelerated sea level rise. The project was authorized (Saugus

Law 102-580 on October 31, 1992. It resulted from the completion of a four year feasibility study at a Federal cost of \$2.6 million conducted by the New England Division Corps of Engineers. After state and regional support and three years of final design at a Federal cost of \$6 million, a new Secretary of Environmental Affairs refused to re-support the project and it was placed inactive. The project was only two years away from starting construction. Consequently, after years of inactivity, it was de-authorized (Saugus River and Tributaries, MA) on March 29, 2009 under WRDA 1986, as reported in the Federal Register Vol. 74, Issue 126 on July 2, 2009. This report is documentation to help the Congressional Delegation sponsor a resolution to reauthorize the project to prevent a decade or more of restudy, endless delays and the danger of severe flooding. The Blizzard of 1978, which caused the investigation, was the flood of record in this region created by a winter

River and Tributaries, MA) by Congress in the Water Resources Development Act of 1992 (WRDA 92) in Public

nor'easter lasting several days surging tide waters into the communities flooding 3,100 buildings. The depths of flooding were up to 7 feet as 4,000 people were evaluated and several homes burned as roads were impassable. Recurring damages from a similar storm would reach \$300 million in the region. With accelerated sea level rise, this 100 year storm approaches a 10 year frequency in 15 years. Four communities (Lynn, Malden, Revere & Saugus) requested the Corps assistance and helped to plan the project with 5 Steering Committees one from each community, and one with state and Federal agencies & private interests. With the help of the Executive Office of Environmental Affairs (EOEA) staff under Secretary James S. Hoyte, Esq. (1983-1988) over 100 meetings were conducted to evaluate problems and alternatives and in 1990 selected the Regional Project with floodgates at the mouth of the Saugus River as the major feature. (The City of Everett was recognized as benefiting from the project in July 2020, where the SPN floodplain spreads into the community affecting about 100 homes.)

The Corps conducted 2-thousand interviews, to determine the levels of flooding from various storms, the damages for over 4,000 homes and businesses, and to design and evaluate structural and non-structural plans for each community. After the four year investigation and environmental review process, the EOEA Secretary John P. DeVillars' (1988-1991) Environmental Certificate found that the selected Regional Project adequately and properly complies with the Massachusetts Environmental Policy Act and its implementing regulations. He then appointed the MDC as the state sponsor supporting the project. The four communities supported it, State legislators planned to sponsor funding for the state's share of costs, and the US Congress authorized it for construction.

Final design followed over 3 years under Secretary Susan F. Tierney's (1991-1993) staff at a cost of \$6 million that included physical and numerical models of the floodgates, the shorefront, and Estuary and other investigations.

Then, in the fall of 1993 Governor Weld hired a new EOEA Secretary Trudy Coxe (1993-1998), a selfproclaimed environmental activist from Rhode Island, who was opposed to construction along the coast and refused to support the project, which was put on hold. Now, with Governor Baker's support to protect communities from coastal flooding and sea level rise, the region may be able to renew the project. 3

HISTORY

The Regional Project was optimized to protect against the Standard Project Northeaster (SPN), the worst storm reasonably likely to occur in this region, which would cause damages over 4 times that of 1978 at over \$1.3 billion, and protect against rising sea levels. The SPN storm would cause a tsunami of tidal surges over the shorefronts and into communities lasting several days. It would be created by a nor'easter during a high astronomic tide accompanied by the storm surge of record, and flood 5,000 homes (8,000 housing units) and businesses. In the SPN floodplain and for the most part, also in the 1978 floodplain is Lynn with 1,200 buildings - half residential and half commercial and industrial, including the General Electric Jet Engine plant. Also in these floodplains are mostly residential buildings located in Everett with 100 buildings, Malden with 300 buildings, Revere with 2,600 buildings, and Saugus with 900 buildings. In the region over 10,000 residents, 20,000 employees, and 400,000 commuters would be affected. SPN flooding would reach 5 to 12-14 feet deep in the communities. Major transportation arteries serving Boston's North shore would again be inundated including US Route 1, 1A and 107, the MBTA Blue Line and the B&M Commuter Rail. The continuous SPN surge of salt water would exceed the top of vehicles so that stranded families (as in 1978) getting on top of their vehicles to avoid rising water would be washed off into the Estuary. The Standard Project Northeaster is the Design Storm for the Regional Project to protect against.

ALTERNATIVES & CURRENT SITUATION

Three basic alternatives were evaluated during the investigation: Local Protection, Nonstructural and the Regional Floodgate project. The following briefly describes alternatives and their application to the current situation in considering a re-study.

Option #1: Local Protection Plans were evaluated for Lynn, Revere, Saugus and the Town Line Brook area of Revere and Malden (& Everett) which generally surrounded

each community with walls and dikes with interior drainage improvements. The economically justified plans would protect about 86 percent of the buildings to the 100 year (1978), 500 year or SPN level of protection. The plans would include 9.8 miles of walls and dikes around the communities' shorefronts and impact 33.7 acres of wetlands, costing \$180 million (2019 price level). The plans lacked acceptability because of: the loss of wetland resources; opposition to the height of structures up to 12 -14 feet; the widths of the structures; the 700 buildings not protected; and the large number of tide gates (80)

feet; the widths of the structures; the 700 buildings not protected; and the large number of tide gates (80) needed on drain/discharge pipes along the shore, including the 30 needed for the jet engine plant at the General Electric in Lynn. There are no significant changes to 4

the existing shorefronts. With rising sea levels, these plans would continue to lack acceptability for the same reasons and be more difficult to modify for rising sea levels, as compared to the Regional project.

Option #2: Nonstructural plans evaluated the most vulnerable 2,100 homes and 585 commercial and public buildings for flood proofing or raising. The results showed that only 240 buildings (9%) were potential candidates and economically feasible. If all buildings were flood proofed in the 100 year plus 1 foot of sea level rise flood plain, the cost would be \$374 million ('19 price level) but not economically justified, nor would SPN protection at a cost \$480 million. The cost to acquire all properties in the 100 year floodplain would approach \$2.5 billion (2019 price level). The plans were not supported since very few of the structures could feasibly be flood proofed, the region faced very high levels of flooding, and the high uncertainty of being able to evacuate 4,000 to 10,000 residents which is difficult to predict and accomplish. Currently, with the rise in sea level and increasing depth and frequency of flooding, this plan is likely to remain unacceptable.

Option#3: The Regional Saugus River Floodgate Plan was evaluated and economically optimized which would protect the entire region against the SPN flood plus 1 foot of Sea Level Rise. All 5,000 buildings in the

floodplain would be protected as well as the infrastructure, including transportation running throughout the region. The Revere and Lynn shorefronts would require maintaining or replacing 3.5 miles of shorefront structures, and include the 1,370 foot long floodgate structure at the mouth of the Saugus River. The 1,650 acre salt water Estuary would be acquired to protect and manage its resources, and protect its water storage area. About 4.8 acres of intertidal habitat would be mitigated. The selected plan was supported by the communities, legislators, the Commonwealth and authorized for construction by the U.S. Congress. Currently, the project would continue to provide a very high level of flood protection against accelerated sea level rise for the entire region, and expect to receive the same level of support.

THE AUTHORIZED PROJECT FEATURES

The authorizing document was the "Feasibility Report and Final Environmental Impact Statement/Report, Water Resources Investigation, Saugus River and Tributaries, Lynn, Malden, Revere and Saugus, Massachusetts, Revised April 1990". The Regional Project which is designed to protect against the SPN and sea level rise, includes floodgates between Revere and Lynn, at the mouth of the Saugus River and tied into 3.1

miles of new shorefront structures. The Floodgate structure with 9 gated openings would have a 100 foot wide navigation gate and eight (8) additional flushing gates, each 50 feet wide. The gates would only be closed when a coastal storm threatens to cause damages. The gates, when open, were designed to provide safe passage for

navigation and the natural flushing and tide levels in the estuary. The Floodgate structure could be modified for higher rates of sea level rise, and would tie into new walls and dikes along Lynn Harbor. In Revere, re-built walls, restored sand dunes and a parkland dike in the Revere Beach Reservation would prevent SPN overtopping. The project includes purchasing in fee the 1,650 acre salt water estuary to preserve it for flood water storage so areas can drain during a storm, and to protect its resources assisted by environmental managers. Removal of a portion of the abandoned I-95 embankment would mitigate 4.8 acres of intertidal impacts. The walls and beach at the Revere Beach Reservation and the Nahant Causeway must be maintained. The project provides the opportunity to breach the I-95 embankment and restore the natural flushing and tide levels in the upper estuary. The 1,650 acre Estuary is the largest salt water marsh near Boston and provides an excellent opportunity for environmental education. The plan would currently cost about \$230 million with the Federal Government financing about 64%. The plan was strongly supported by the communities, found acceptable environmentally, and supported by the Commonwealth.

ENVIRONMENTAL RESTORATION PROJECT

The Regional Project by first providing flood protection, then provides the opportunity to accomplish the Environmental Restoration Project for the Upper Saugus/Pines River Estuary by breaching the abandoned I-95 embankment (which cuts through the center of the Estuary) to: significantly improve flushing and tide levels to 500 acres of marsh; provide increased productivity for fish and wildlife; stop the deterioration of habitat; eliminate frequent fires; and nearly eliminate the dreaded marsh mosquito. At the request of Federal (Environmental Protection Agency & National Marine Fisheries Service), EOEA state agencies and town of Saugus, alternatives to breach the I-95 embankment to provide environmental enhancement of the marsh, were being developed during the Regional Project's final design, until the projects were stopped.

The Estuary Restoration Project includes: breaching a new opening and widening the existing narrow opening in the abandoned I-95 embankment in the upper estuary adjacent to East Saugus; and provide low berms or walls and improved drainage along the shore of East Saugus. East Saugus improvements are needed to offset the two foot rise in high spring tides created by breaching that would return natural flushing to the

upper estuary. The reporting document is "Saugus River & Tributaries, Flood Damage Reduction Project, Lynn, Malden, Revere and Saugus, MA, Environmental Restoration Project, September 1991" which had been prepared and reviewed by the Corps, revised and was used to obtain comments from Washington, when the project stopped. The Restoration project would cost about \$6.6 million (2020 pl) and the Federal Government would finance 75%. The report recommended that "The high Ecological Quality benefits, low comparable cost, public support and Federal interest appears to

warrant further investigation of Environmental Restoration--following coordination of these findings and receipt of sponsor support for completing detailed studies." It is recommended that the Environmental Restoration Project be included with the

re-authorized Regional project due to these findings. There is \$2 million dollars of cost saving by combining the two projects.

COST OF RE-AUTHORIZED PROJECT

The estimated cost of the Regional project including Environmental Restoration is \$230 million at 2020 prices and the Federal Government had planned to pay 64% and the rest by the Commonwealth. Costs were updated from 1989 by the RS Means cost index.

PROJCT BENEFITS & ECONOMICS

The project would prevent the loss of life, injury, hardships, suffering, and psychological affects from coastal disasters, the forecasting of coastal storms and rising sea levels. Benefits were updated from 1989 by the RS Means cost index.

In the event of a Standard Project Northeaster it would prevent an estimated \$1.3 billion in damages to 5,000 buildings and infrastructure serving Boston's North Shore.

Of particular interest, the floodgate structure would eliminate the need to raise or construct seawalls along 25 miles of developed shorefront. Without the floodgate structure, these walls would be up to 12 to 14 feet tall for the same SPN level of protection and border the Saugus and Pines Rivers impacting wetlands and views in the communities.

It's important to note, the project would remove buildings from the high risk floodplain and when FEMA revises the floodplain maps would eliminated the need for flood insurance.

TIME & COST REQUIRED TO START CONSTRUCTION

The Corps of Engineers recently advised Revere and Saugus that since the project was de-authorized in 2009, a New Study Start and competition for Federal funding is required which could take 3-4 years to be funded since only 4 or 5 new starts are approved nation wide each year. The city agreed to get the ball rolling to request the new study; however they realize the advantage to have Congress re-authorize the project to prevent years of delays.

The second option and very important to prevent years of delays and re-study, should be pursued, as well. The Congressional Delegation could possibly sponsor a resolution to Re-authorize the project due to the continued and pending disasters from accelerated sea level rise threatening your region, and then modify the design, if necessary. This could by-pass the extensive re-study phase. Although some updates of the environmental reports and design documents will likely be required partly due to the ½ foot of sea level rise, but could save about 9 years of planning and delays, as follows.

The original project schedule required 5 years to plan (\$2.6 million at 1990 pl) the project (1985-1990) and review reports, completed 3 years of design (1990-1993) then stopped with 1 year of design remaining plus 1 year for Plans & Specs (1995) before starting construction. A total of 10 years from start of planning to start of construction. At todays prices it would have cost about \$6 million to complete the final year of design and preparation of Plans and Specifications (P&S).

If the project could be Re-Authorized in 2021 it should take a year (2022) to revise existing environmental and design documents and 2 years to complete design and P&S (2024) to start construction. The cost to complete this phase, which includes an additional \$1 million to update the completed design and environmental documents. is about \$7.5 million. Of this amount, about \$4.7 million would be a non-Federal cost based on the Federal cost of the completed design, plus design efforts to be completed.

However, if the region waits for a New Study Start in 3-4 years (2024) and requires at least 9 years of planning and design prior to starting construction (2033), it could take 9 years longer before the region realizes the start of construction. The cost to complete this effort including \$3 million for planning and \$10 million for design and P&S for a total of \$13 million. This is \$5-6 million more than re-authorization.

REASONS FOR DE-AUTHORIZATION

After the meeting when Secretary Coxe refused to renew support, an MDC 8-31-93 letter advised that the state must "...consider more fully nonstructural alternatives before making a final decision...". The justified project with renewed environmental benefits had thoroughly evaluated Nonstructural Plans. The project was stopped by the Corps of Engineers at that point to await the State's decision, which has not been received. Neither the state nor the 4 local sponsors were advised that the project would be de-authorized. The Corps requires that projects that are inactive without funding for about 7 years be de-authorized. Previously, projects stayed authorized on the books for years, like Revere Beach was authorized for 30 years before being constructed.

WHY PROJECT DELAYED FOR 27 YEARS 1993 -2020

After Secretary Coxe refused to renew support in 1993, the public was not informed since advertising this information is not the Corps policy, and so there was no known protest by the public. It was recently learned that those closest to and familiar with the project believed it was stopped because of environmental reasons, policy changes to support "more nature based solutions", and waiting for the state's review of nonstructural options may have all contributed to accepting the delay. This may be the case, but it was the position of a Secretary, an environmental activist from out of state, who stated opposition to any construction along the coast. Even after Secretary Coxe departed, the hope to restart it had dissipated. Then in 2019 the former Corps Project Manager on the project recognized the rising sea level threat to the communities and potential support of Governor Baker. The Project Manager therefore sent out information to legislators and communities reminding them of the project, which renewed the support.

STATE/REGIONAL SUPPORT

Recently presentations were made on the Regional Project to Revere officials and the City Council in July 2020 with indications they supported the project and would pursue actions to prepare an application for a New Study Start, and request the Congressional Delegation to sponsor a resolution to re-authorize the Regional Project. Also, on July 13, 2020 the Town of Saugus Town Meeting Members voted 43 to 1 to request Governor Baker to restart the Regional Saugus River Floodgate Project.

Previously, the Metropolitan District Commission, under Secretary John DeVillars, provided a March 5, 1990 letter supporting the project and indicating that they were designated the local sponsor. 10

Previously, State Representative Steven V. Angelo, Chairman, Committee on Natural Resources, letter dated 11-12-91 stated "strong support" and "..ready to sponsor legislation to fund the State's share of the funding (35%) through appropriations."

Numerous letters supporting the project from the four communities were received during the original investigation.

Finally, for your additional information, the former Assistant Secretary of Environmental Affairs, the head of MEPA, during the investigation and my Environmental Manager are currently so convinced this project was and still is a very good and environmentally sound project, that they enthusiastically helped me prepare the 100 letters and supporting documents over the past year that I sent to legislators and communities reminding them of this project. Reasons for this support are: the project significantly reduced all environmental impacts, especially designing the floodgates to maintain the natural flushing and tide levels in the Estuary; it provides significant benefits to the Estuary through its acquisition, protection and management; it provides protection against rising sea levels; and it provides the opportunity (and planned) to breach the I-95 embankment to restore flushing and tide levels to 500 acres of wetlands in the upper Estuary, which is an environmental Federal/State goal.

REVIEW ENVIRONMENTAL ISSUES, PROJECT BENEFITS, FEATURES & COSTS

There are several factors to consider after 30 years whether to re-study the Regional Project; Environmental Issues, Project Benefits, and Project Features & Costs. Reconsideration of Alternatives, previously discussed, is also important, which suggested the Regional Project would continue to be the preferred alternative and is therefore evaluated in this section.

A. Environmental Issues--The February 20,1990 Certificate of the Secretary of Environmental Affairs on the Final Environmental Impact Report stated that the "...project adequately and properly complies with the Massachusetts Environmental Policy Act and with its implementing regulations.." Six major environmental issues were addressed in the Certificate which would be the same today, or improved with a re-authorized project which includes Environmental Restoration of the upper 500 acres of the estuary.

1. Marsh Vitality--Stopping the peak of flooding events in the marsh would not adversely impact it since the gates would close after the wetlands were submerged. When the gates are open, there is no change in the flushing or tide levels in the estuary.

With Restoration of the upper 500 acres of the estuary, there would be a substantial improvement in the marsh vitality with increased natural flushing and tide levels.

2. Marsh Build-Up--There remains no significant change in sediment transport into the marsh. With Restoration there would be a significant improvement in sediment transport to the upper marsh through restoring its natural flushing and tide levels.

3. Wetland Mitigation--Acceptable mitigation of the 4.8 acres of wetland impacts would still be achieved. With Restoration through removal and breaching of the I-95 embankment with enhancement of the 500 acres would increase requested "mitigation".

4. Facility Changes Due to Sea level Rise--The facilities "..will be designed so that sea level changes up to 3 or 4 feet can be accommodated if future study determines that such changes are desirable, feasible and environmental acceptable."

5. Evacuation/Floodproofing--These measures remain not to be viable, and less so, with the increased frequency of flooding, greater depths of flooding and uncertainty with evacuating 10 to 20,000 people.

6. Acquisition of Flood Storage Lands--Acquisition of the estuary remains a part of the project and must occur with a manager to protect it and provide for regional education.

B. Project Benefits--Benefits are determined by the developments in the floodplain, ie. damages prevented, and frequency of flooding. There has been some new developments, largely above the 100 year floodplain; however, there has been a substantial increase in the frequency of flooding with rising sea level, and thus a substantial increase in benefits from preventing these more frequent damages. Benefits would also increase if damages are estimated for the 1,200 buildings protected in the Town Line Brook floodplain for Everett, Malden and Revere, and also for the 300 Saugus homes in the upper Saugus River which have not been evaluated. Damages and benefits also increase from rising inflation for the costs of repairing damages.

C. Project Features & Costs--Since the structures were being designed to easily accommodate up to a 4 foot rise in sea level, there would only be minor changes in costs as sea levels rise. For example, designing the foundation of the floodgate structure, walls and dikes for a 4 foot rise, as planned, would only result in minor changes to raise structures a foot or two. As with benefits, inflation raises the project 12

cost from the original estimate. No significant changes are anticipated in the design since the type of gates selected have been proven for over 50 years to be very reliable in New England for both New Bedford Harbor, MA and Fox Point, RI. Modeling showed that restoring sand dunes at Point of Pines to be more effective and less costly than revetments. Environmental Restoration is feasible due to the low comparable cost compared to other environmental restoration projects, and would increase the Regional project cost by about \$6.6 million or 3% to a total of \$230 million. There would be about a \$2 million savings by combining the Regional project and Restoration.

RECOMMENDATIONS

The Governor, the Secretary of the Executive Office of Energy and Environmental Affairs, legislative representatives and communities should be contacted to determine renewed support. With renewed support it would then be recommended that the Regional Saugus River Floodgate Project be sponsored in a resolution to re-authorize it by Congress to facilitate the protection of five communities severely threatened and in eminent danger from coastal flooding and accelerated sea level rise. Re-authorization would reduce the start of construction by 9 years and reduce the cost by an estimated \$6 million as compared to a New Study Start request. The re-authorized project should include the Environmental Restoration of the Upper Saugus/Pines River Estuary which would substantially improve the project's environmental benefits and acceptance. There would be a significant increase in the project's economic Benefits, but not Costs, due to sea level rise over the past 30 years. No other alternative is acceptable nor would one provide the high level of protection required against rising sea level. Consequently, it would be a waste of time, money and effort to re-study the problems when there is an increase for both environmental and economic benefits and less of an increase in cost. A review of these factors and permits can easily be accomplished during final design, as well as, the coordination and design of the Restoration project.

The Regional Project should be re-authorize since the danger of accelerated sea level rise from climate change is a major concern and an increasing and eminent risk. The region experienced several coastal floods in 2018 easily reaching record tide levels. This region has been recognized by other studies as one of the most

vulnerable locations for accelerated sea level rise along the Massachusetts coast, and possibly along the East coast. I believe the policy of the Commonwealth has returned to one that is more receptive to the concern for public safety, as well as protection of the environment. Not only does this project provide an extremely high level of flood protection to the five communities, but also important environmental benefits. 13

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Acts of 2011, Chapter 183, the City of Revere, acting by and through its Mayor and City Council, in concurrence with the approval granted by the Conservation Commission of the City of Revere, was authorized to convey to the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, acting by and through the Commissioner of the Department of Conservation and Recreation, for conservation purposes, those certain parcels of land located in the Rumney Marsh Area of Critical Environmental Concern to the Commonwealth of Massachusetts described as follows:

Map 19, Block 327, Parcels 3, 4, 5, 6, 8, 10, 11, 13, 14, 15 and 16, containing approximately 40.36 acres; Map 19, Block 328, Parcels 2, 3 and 6 containing approximately 14.34 acres; Map 19, Block 329, Parcel 10 containing approximately 1.3 acres,; Map 20, Block 329, Parcels 1, 13 and 14 and containing approximately 15.25 acres; Map 20, Block 330, Parcels 3 and 4 and containing approximately 14.50 acres; and Map 30, Block 448A, Parcel 2 and containing approximately 3.46 acres (collectively, the "**Rumney Marsh Parcels**");

WHEREAS, the City of Revere has record title the Rumney Marsh Parcels and is not aware of any valid right or title to, interest in or claim against the title to such parcels but desires to take the Rumney Marsh Parcels by eminent domain pursuant to an Order of Taking by the City (the "<u>Order of Taking</u>") to confirm its title to the Rumney Marsh Parcels and to clarify vague or insufficient legal descriptions set forth in the historic deeds for the Rumney Marsh Parcels, and in connection therewith, to record a taking plan prepared by Feldman Land Surveyors dated

_____, 2020, which establishes the record boundaries of the Rumney Marsh Parcels (the "**Taking Plan**") in order to convey said Rumney Marsh Parcels to the Commonwealth;

WHEREAS, it is further necessary to record an approval not required plan with respect to the property known as Assessor's Parcel Map 19, Block 329, Parcel 10 in order to exclude certain existing encroachments and City property onto said parcel from the conveyance (the "<u>Oak Island</u> ANR Plan");

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Acts of 2005, Chapter 154 of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, whereby the City of Revere was authorized to convey to the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, acting by and through the Department of Conservation and Recreation, all those parcels of land conveyed to the City of Revere by Vincent LoPresti and Sidney L. Boorstein on December 22, 2000 and recorded in the Suffolk County Registry of Deeds in Book 25713, Page, 236, which parcels are part of the Belle Isle Marsh, which is part of the Rumney Marshes Area of Critical Environmental Concern, and which include the following described parcels:

- (I) That certain parcel of land situated on the Southwesterly side of Pearl Avenue designated as Lots numbered 170, 171 and 172 in the records of the City of Revere Assessor's office;
- (II) That certain parcel of land situated on the Northerly side of Crystal Avenue,
 designated as Lots numbered 350-360 inclusive, Lots 333 to 348 inclusive, Lots
 377 to 396 inclusive, part of Lot 376 and a twenty-five-foot-wide strip;
- (III) Those parcels shown on the City of Revere Assessors Plate 1 represented as parcels 33, 32, 31, 30, 29, 3, 4 and a 7.2 acre parcel on the southerly side of Crystal Avenue abutting Lots 3, 4 and 5 of said Plate 1; and

 (IV) Those certain parcels as shown in the City of Revere Block Plan No. 43A
 September 1933 as Lots 350 to Lots 360 inclusive (collectively, the "<u>Belle Isle</u> <u>Parcels</u>");

WHEREAS, it is further necessary to record an approval not required plan with respect to the Belle Isle Parcels in order to exclude certain existing encroachments onto portions of said parcel from the conveyance (the "<u>Belle Isle ANR Plan</u>").

NOW THEREFORE:

VOTED, that in the furtherance of the conservation and recreational purposes for which the Rumney Marsh Parcels are intended to be conveyed to the Commonwealth, the Council approves the Order of Taking substantially in the form attached hereto as <u>Exhibit A</u> and the recording of the Taking Plan substantially in the form attached hereto as <u>Exhibit B</u>.

VOTED, that no damages arising from any such taking shall be awarded at the time the Order of Taking is executed or when any such damages might vest; however the Council hereby reserves the right to modify the damage award at any time pursuant to applicable law, and further agrees to publish a notice of the taking in a newspaper of general circulation upon the recording of the Order of Taking for a period of two consecutive weeks.

VOTED, that the Council approves the execution and recording of the Oak Island ANR Plan with respect to Assessor's Parcel Map 19, Block 329, Parcel 10, substantially in the form attached hereto as <u>Exhibit C</u>.

VOTED, that the Council approves the execution and recording of the Belle Isle ANR Plan, substantially in the form attached hereto as <u>Exhibit D</u>.

VOTED, that the Council hereby approves the conveyance to the Commonwealth acting by and through the Division of Capital Asset Management and Maintenance and the Department of Conservation and Recreation of all the foregoing parcels and hereby authorizes the Mayor to

execute any and all documents and take all actions necessary and convenient to complete the foregoing, including but not limited to deeds for the Rumney Marsh Parcels and the Belle Isle Parcels substantially in the forms attached hereto as <u>Exhibit E</u> and <u>Exhibit F</u> respectively.

WHEREAS, the City of Revere (hereinafter called the "City") is a public body politic and corporate organized and existing pursuant to the provisions of the Massachusetts General Laws, with offices at Revere City Hall, 281 Broadway, Revere, Massachusetts 02151; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 30 of Chapter 43 of the Massachusetts General Laws, the City has the power to purchase or take by eminent domain real property within the City limits for any purpose; and

WHEREAS, the City, pursuant to the Acts of 2011, Chapter 183, acting by and through its Mayor and City Council, in concurrence with the approval granted by the Conservation Commission of the City, has agreed to convey to the Commonwealth of Massachusetts acting by and through the Department of Conservation and Recreation (the "Commonwealth"), certain parcels of real property constituting approximately 89.21 acres owned by the City in the area of Revere known as Rumney Marsh Area of Critical Environmental Concern (each a "Parcel" and collectively the "Parcels" or "Property"); and

WHEREAS, the conveyance of municipal property for conservation and recreation constitutes a public purpose; and

WHEREAS, the Property was originally acquired by the City through various tax takings and foreclosure deeds; and

WHEREAS, an examination of the chain of title for the Parcels has disclosed that many of the Parcels contain vague legal descriptions and lack recorded plans in the chain of title to properly describe or evidence the Parcel lot lines; and

WHEREAS, in order to convey clear record title to the Property to the Commonwealth, the City desires to take the Property by eminent domain pursuant to a taking plan prepared by Feldman Land Surveyors dated ______ to be recorded at the Suffolk County Registry of Deeds (hereinafter, the "Registry") in order to establish definitive metes and bounds legal descriptions for each Parcel; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City has voted to authorize this taking, a copy of which vote is attached hereto as <u>Exhibit A</u> (the "City Council Vote"); and

WHEREAS, the Conservation Commission of the City has agreed and assented to the taking by the City and subsequent conveyance to the Commonwealth for conservation and recreational purposes, a copy of which assent is attached to the City Council Vote; and

WHEREAS, as the City is the current owner of the Property no award for damages shall be made as may be required by law at this time subject to Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 79, Section 6;

NOW, THEREFORE, it is ORDERED that the CITY OF REVERE, acting though and under the authority of and pursuant to the powers vested in the City and pursuant to the provisions of Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 79, as amended, and of any and every power and authority enabling it, granted or implied, having complied with all of the preliminary requirements prescribed by law, hereby takes for itself in fee simple by eminent domain for the purposes hereinbefore set forth, all those parcels of land together with the improvements thereon located in Revere, Massachusetts and more particularly identified as follows:

OAK ISLAND ANR PLAN



Project Description: Our project would fund the purchase of 55 Chromebooks to enhance technology access for students at the Beachmont Veterans Memorial School. This investment would allow us to reach our goal of one-to-one Chromebooks for all students in grades 2 to 5. While students regularly engage in a robust technology education program, including coding, engineering and robotics, this work is generally limited to technology class. Our current inventory includes 145 Chromebooks, some of which were previously purchased using a portion of Mayor Arrigo's \$10,000 supplemental funding. At our existing capacity, Chromebooks are shared between classrooms and grade levels across the school. This means that teachers and students cannot consistently rely on technology for use in daily lessons or across content areas throughout the day. Time is also spent coordinating schedules and managing these shared materials around the school. With Revere COVID-19 cases on the rise and the state of Massachusetts leading the nation in employment at 17.4% as reported last month, our community is experiencing a very challenging time. Adding to these challenges is the renewed drive to crack down on code violations and issue fines for trash and parking violations. While I am a huge proponent of accountability and playing by the rules, I see the impact that these fines are having on my neighbors during an already difficult time. Many around us are enduring financial hardship as companies issue layoffs and some of those that are working struggle to find daycare. Residents that would normally be at work during the day come out to find street sweeping tickets where they may have never received such an infraction before which increases stress and financial strain. Our short term outlook does not appear to get any easier with Mayor Arrigo's recent announcement and decisions around our spiking COVID numbers to which I believe was both the difficult and correct decision to make. I am writing to you today to request that the city refrain from issuing such fines and tickets, as they did with the onset of COVID-19, until conditions improve. I understand that this is a tumultuous situation and difficult ask given revenue shortfalls for the city. I don't need to remind you that we are all in this together however right now those experiencing illness and financial hardship need your empathy and assistance to alleviate whatever additional burdens we can. 

I am writing to request a public hearing for one new Loan Order for borrowing under the Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection's (MassDEP's) Calendar Year 2020 (CY-2020) Clean Water State Revolving Fund ("CWSRF"). The CWSRF was established to provide a low-cost funding mechanism to assist municipalities in complying with federal and state water quality requirements. In this round, the City is seeking to borrow funding for construction of the following project:

• CWSRF Construction Project No. 6648 - \$6,700,000 for the Phase 11 Construction – I/I, IDDE, Pump Station & Drainage

This CWSRF loan received initial approval from MassDEP through the CY-2020 CWSRF Intended Use Plan.

As with previous CWSRF projects, in order to take advantage of these low interest loans and potential principal forgiveness again this year, the City must complete two steps: first – approve a Resolution expressly authorizing the Mayor to file all applications and execute documents necessary for the loans; and second – approve Loan Orders for the balance of each project. I have attached copies of the required Resolutions and Loan Orders. The construction work proposed with this new fund, as well as similar work necessary in future years, will be required commitments of the City's Consent Decree with the U.S. Dept. of Justice, to remedy historic violations of the Federal Clean Water Act.

Specifically, the work proposed with the \$6,700,000 in CY-2020 CWSRF 6648 construction funds will be utilized for five specific categories of work:

(1) To remove and redirect sources of illicit connections to the sewer system.

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Attachment: Phase 11 Construction Project No. 6648 (20-292 : Phase 11 Construction Loan Order Request)

- (2) To extend drains as necessary to remove illicit connections to the sewer system.
- (3) To rehabilitate sewer pipelines, pumping stations and manholes to reduce inflow into the wastewater system.
- (4) To rehabilitate storm drains and pumping stations to improve flood control and/or to reduce the amount of stormwater entering the wastewater system.
- (5) To complete the capital improvements to stormwater and wastewater pump stations throughout the City.

I ask that the City Council approve the Resolutions and move this Loan Order to a public hearing at its earliest opportunity. In advance of the public hearing, I will arrange for the City's staff and our consultants, CDM Smith, to provide the City Council with an update on the status of the previous and ongoing work completed within our sewer and stormwater systems to meet the demands of the EPA, the U.S. Justice Dept. and the Consent Decree. This background should assist the Council as it deliberates on this most recent funding request.

Any premium received upon the sale of any bonds or notes approved by this order, less any such premium applied to the payment of the costs of issuance of such bonds or notes, may be applied to the payment of costs approved by this vote in accordance with Chapter 44, Section 20 of the General Laws, thereby reducing the amount authorized to be borrowed to pay such costs by a like amount.

Dear Council Members:

I am writing to request a public hearing for a new Loan Order for borrowing under the Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection's (MassDEP's) Calendar Year 2020 (CY-2020) Clean Water State Revolving Fund ("CWSRF"). The CWSRF was established to provide a low-cost funding mechanism to assist municipalities in complying with federal and state water quality requirements. In this round, the City is seeking to borrow funding for planning of the following project:

 CWSRF Planning Project No. 6628 - \$1,300,000 for the Phase 12 Investigations Project

This CWSRF loan received initial approval from MassDEP through the CY-2020 CWSRF Intended Use Plan.

As with previous CWSRF projects, in order to take advantage of these low interest loans and potential principal forgiveness again this year, the City must complete two steps: first – approve a Resolution expressly authorizing the Mayor to file all applications and execute documents necessary for the loans; and second – approve Loan Orders for the balance of each project. I have attached copies of the required Resolutions and Loan Orders. The equipment and planning work associated with this new fund will assist the City with ongoing Operations and Maintenance commitments required by the City's Consent Decree with the U.S. Dept. of Justice, to remedy historic violations of the Federal Clean Water Act.

Specifically, the work proposed with the \$1,300,000 in CY-2020 CWSRF 6628 planning funds will be utilized for four specific categories:

(1) To investigate the condition and operation of the sanitary sewer and stormwater system.

- (2) To continue with citywide supplemental field investigations and activities associated with illicit discharge detection and elimination (IDDE).
- (3) To continue to develop and implement a house to house inspection program for the purpose of identifying sump pumps for removal or redirection.
- (4) To conduct flow metering of the wastewater system to enhance the capabilities of the hydraulic model.

I ask that the City Council approve the Resolutions and move this Loan Order to a public hearing at its earliest opportunity. In advance of the public hearing, I will arrange for the City's staff and our consultants, CDM Smith, to provide the City Council with an update on the status of the previous and ongoing work completed within our sewer and stormwater systems to meet the demands of the EPA, the U.S. Justice Dept. and the Consent Decree. This background should assist the Council as it deliberates on this most recent funding request.
