The UWTVA Community Fund:

Contributions to the Community Fund are flexible funds that are spread throughout our service area where the need is greatest. Community members make funding decisions based on a thorough process. Funds support local programs coordinated by organizations referred to as Community Partners.

The Hope Fund:

The Hope Fund provides assistance for unmet needs of children, removing barriers to enable low-income children to engage in a wide variety of experiences/opportunities such as after-school programs, camps, athletic team participation, etc. We are building a brighter future one child at a time.

The Very Basics Fund:

Food, fuel and shelter programs are supported through The Very Basics Fund, helping our community stay fed, warm, and housed.

Special Initiatives:

Packs for Progress

Through this popular program, school supplies and backpacks are collected for students throughout the region who otherwise may not be able to afford them. More than 600 are distributed annually.

Tools for Teachers

Totes of school supplies and other needed items identified by teachers (such as underwear and cleaning wipes) are delivered to 17 area schools through Tools for Teachers.

Western Maine CA\$H Coalition

This free tax program helps save tax preparation fees and connects filers to resources to help them earn, keep and grow their hard earned money.

Community Energy Challenge

The Community Energy Challenge is a volunteer-led interior window panel project that saves money and energy costs and keeps people warm. Thousands of custom-made window panels have been made since 2009.

The Pantry Project

The Pantry Project seeks donated food and cash at area businesses and organizations that is then donated to area food pantries.
