In the past few weeks we have been studying animals in winter! We've learned about animals that hibernate as well as those who adapt to cold weather or migrate to a warmer place.

"The sun moves like planets do. Planets and the sun rotate and orbit." -Paige


"I learned that you can rotate a ball in your hand and that you can orbit a ball around your head in a circle." -Rayleeana

First graders have been learning how to write Narrative stories! A Narrative story is a story that tells about <u>YOU</u>!


We practiced "story sequence" by thinking about the steps it takes to build a snowman!



During Quarter 2 we worked on Narrative Writing. Here are some of our stories!




News from Ms. Pilote's First Grade Classroom

Since the beginning of school students in Ms. Pilote's class began building stamina in reading to self for part of our literacy program, Daily Five. To help with this, Ms. Pilote integrated "Reading Through the Appalachian Trail" for her students as her father was hiking the trail in person. The goal for reading to self is 20 minutes a day, and Ms. Pilote's class built their stamina starting this project at just 5 minutes a day. Every minute read represents a mile "hiked" on the AT. Ms. Pilote connected this with her father building his stamina with every mile he hiked. He averaged 15-23 miles a day.

Starting in Georgia, students read to self, making their way to the state of Maine. Each state finished, students learned quick facts about the state and where to find them on a map. Ms. Pilote included photos of her father and his trip along the way. Currently, Ms. Pilote's class is reading to self 20 minutes a day and have only 3 states left to complete the trail! Ms. Pilote's father created a video, answering students' questions and discussed what he brought on his trip with him, which will be shared at the very end.

We are working on STAR BREATHING to help calm our bodies and focus our attention.





Daily reading promotes lifelong literacy habits, increases vocabulary, and can be just plain FUN!

Visual Discrimination Skills and Visual Memory...What are they and why are they important??

Paying attention to visual detail and the ability to recall what you've seen are critical skills; especially when it comes to reading. In order to use print, children must learn the sometimes subtle differences between letters. As adults we often take for granted knowing the differences between letters like r, n, and h! Skilled readers instantly recognize words they see often. Remembering letter sequences of words like *the, what,* and *again* allows us to read fluently and conserve brainpower for comprehension.

Several appealing and easy activities can hone these skills! Playing Memory and sorting objects by color, shape, or unique features are simple ways to enhance visual memory and visual discrimination. Other ideas include matching games, *Kim's game*, I Spy, Spot the Difference, and recreating pictures or building things from memory*. At first, various pictures and objects can be used; eventually use letters and words in these same activities and watch your child grow!! Maybe **they'll** remember what's on that grocery list you forgot at home!!

Math at Mallett:

What are students learning in math this month? *Kindergarteners are:*

- Counting to 80
- Adding and subtracting pairs for 0, 1, 2, and 3
- Reading, writing, and comparing numbers between 1 and 10
- Solving story problems within 7
- Measuring objects

1st graders are:

- Counting to 120
- Adding and subtracting pairs for 6 and 7
- Reading, writing, and comparing numbers between 0-99
- Solving story problems within 10
- Exploring tens and ones

2nd graders are:

- Counting from any number within 1000
- Adding and subtracting teen numbers
- Reading, writing, and comparing numbers between 0-1000
- Solving two-step story problems within 100
- · Adding and subtracting two- and three-digit numbers

And our students are learning how to be "mathletes"! Just like athletes practice to improve their sport skills, mathletes practice at home for 2 minutes every night to improved their math skills. Get in the habit of practicing one skill every night for two minutes (like counting or flashcards), and you'll be amazed at how fast improvement happens!



DID YOU KNOW?

Basketball was invented by Physical Education teacher James Naismith in 1891 as a way for students to keep fit and busy indoors during winter. The first hoop was made from a peach basket provided by the school janitor and was nailed to a balcony ledge.

FUN HEALTH TIP:

Get moving outside this winter! Be sure to dress warm and try out some different activities like snowshoeing, cross-country skiing, snowboarding, downhill skiing, sledding, building a snow fort, ice skating, throwing and catching snowballs.

IMPORTANT REMINDER:

For safety all students should be bringing sneakers to Physical Education!
